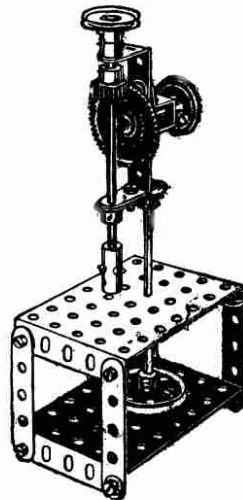

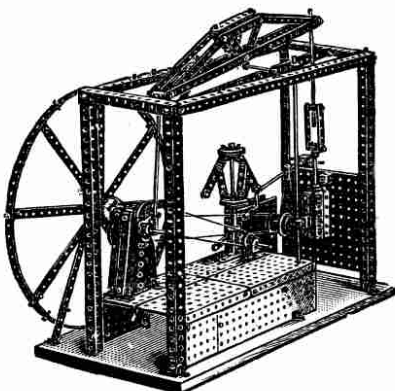
Giant Airship.



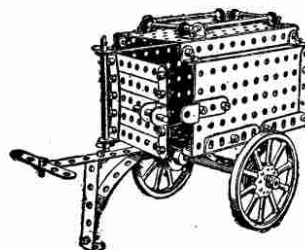

(Continued.)

The Guild members banded themselves together and used all their great influence and power to resist the Bill, but although they managed to retain a great many of their rights and privileges from a commercial and social point of view, their colleges, churches and chapels were seized and confiscated.

The Guilds never recovered. The former strict rules were gradually relaxed, and little by little unscrupulous men won their way to power. They altered everything completely, and soon the Guilds became leagues or companies of employers and capitalists, who used them for grinding down the poor workmen and townspeople for their own profit. Efforts were made in Elizabeth's reign to restore the Guilds to their former purity of purpose, but they were of no avail, and with the growth of civilization it is doubtful if they can ever exist again as they did hundreds of years ago.

But although the old ideal of the Guild is dead, the spirit that animated it is as alive to-day as ever.

Members will be interested to know that in choosing the name "Meccano Guild," the idea of starting a movement based on the splendid ideals and traditions of the old Guilds was foremost in our minds, and in assisting to build up a spirit of good fellowship and comradeship they will be creating friendships and happy times that will endure throughout their lives.

Life Story of Meccano

Great skill is required in setting up these machines in the first place; and even after they are set up they have to be continually watched and fine adjustments made to ensure accurate production.

There are many machines in this department which are exceedingly fascinating to watch. The chain-making machine, for instance, which makes our sprocket chain, through which a plain wire is passed at one end whilst at the other a continuous length of completed chain emerges, is a most complicated and efficient machine which seems to be almost human.

Then there is the special machine for drilling the holes in our couplings. They are all drilled in one operation and it is exceedingly interesting to see the girl operating the handle and all the drills coming together on the coupling at the same time. You can imagine the time saved in using a machine of this type as compared with the usual way of drilling a hole at a time.

Another useful and ingenious machine is the one which we use for automatically assembling the setscrews into wheels.

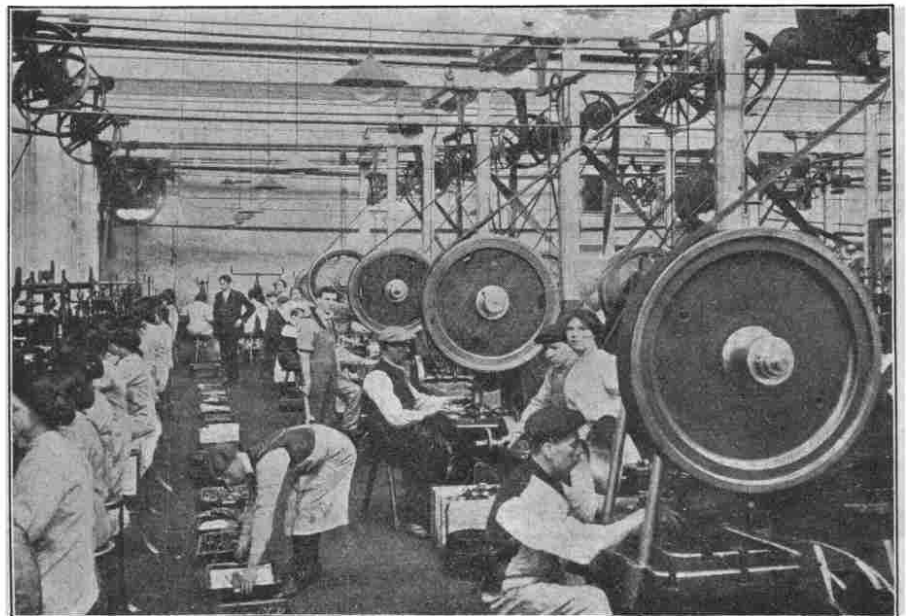
I think, however, that the machines which would interest you most are those which are used for making our bolts. The bolts themselves are made from

steel rod which comes to us in huge coils. The end of the rod is fed into the machine, which automatically cuts it off at the required length and puts the head of the bolt on it. These machines work at a tremendous pace and give a production of thousands of gross each per week. From every ton of wire which is fed into them, we receive a ton of bolts, there being absolutely no waste of any kind.

The next step in the process is cutting the nick in the head. The bolts are poured into the large hopper of a nicking machine and the machine itself sorts them into perfect order, one behind the other, and they go sliding down a groove which conveys them to a kind of circular saw which cuts the nick, after which, by a little turn of the machine, they are thrown into a container ready for the next process.

The operator then conveys them to another machine which rolls the thread on them. For this process they are again poured into a hopper and by the same mechanism as in the nicking machine they are arranged one behind the other, conveyed down a groove, and to that part of the machine which rolls the thread on them, one by one, as rapidly as you can count. These are the busiest machines you ever saw. They work with a will all day long, producing many, many millions of bolts during the year, exactly uniform in size and shape.

Any boy who fails to join the Guild is withholding his friendship and help from the best and brainiest boys in the kingdom, and is also depriving himself of their help and companionship. The Meccano Guild stands for pleasure and enjoyment, instruction and progress, clean and straightforward living, and for bringing out what is best and most useful in boys.

After you have read the Guild Secretary's announcements in this issue we are confident that you will want to join up with the movement, give all the help you can to it, and take full advantage of the good things already announced and many others to come.

Club Notes.

ASCENSION.—Club Leader comments upon keenness of members and good attendance at meetings. Congratulations to the energetic secretary, Master M. Prater who recently won a scholarship, being first of 500 boys.

COALVILLE MECCANO CLUB.—Recently affiliated club. Mr. S. Leivers, the Club Leader, has drawn up an excellent programme for the Club's first session.

CIRENCESTER GRAMMAR SCHOOL.—An excellent start by those responsible for the promotion of this newly-affiliated club, and with energetic Master H. W. Inward, as secretary, the Club should make splendid progress.

CLAYGATE MECCANO CLUB.—The Claygate Meccano Club makes progress. A visit to the sewerage works proved very interesting and instructive, Mr. Britnell, the Assistant Club Leader, explaining the working of the machinery. Club trip to Brighton was a very enjoyable affair, thanks to the energies of Mr. Haynes and Mr. Britnell. Winter session commences Sept. 4th, and a splendid programme has been drawn up.

HOLY TRINITY.—Second annual exhibition held on June 26th was an unqualified success. Twenty models on view, including a Crane made from a "1901" set of Meccano. Fret-work models also exhibited, and a clever novel feature of the exhibition was "The Fine Art Gallery." Exhibition well patronised, and out of profits realised, £1 handed to St. Dunstan's.

GOSPORT.—Members have been kept together during the summer through the cricket

club and the activities of Master H. Beane, the secretary; a busy winter session is anticipated.

FERRYHILL DISTRICT.—The progress made by this Club has been amazing. Affiliated with Guild in January, membership now 150. Mr. Banner's report for the session which ended in April, shows that the scope of the Club is both wide and varied. He writes:—

Mr. Banner thanks all who have assisted, and appeals for further help to assist different sections of Club during next session.

SMALL HEATH.—Mr. Edge, the Club Leader, recognises possibilities of a Meccano Club, and at opening meeting of the "Small Heath Meccano Club" impressed upon members that he desired to make the Club "a Club of comrades to assist each other in becoming real men, with active, clear, and clean brains." I have no doubt that Small Heath boys will respond to Mr. Edge's efforts.

ST. MARTIN'S (West Acton).—Recently affiliated. Rev. H. C. Williams has kindly consented to become president, and Club has a busy season before it under leadership of Mr. L. H. Sutton.

WALLINGBROOK.—The enthusiasm for the Club has been maintained through the summer as a result of activities of secretary, Master E. H. C. Edmunds. Recently a debate on relative merits of Electricity and Steam Power proved so popular that this new feature has been added to the Club's programme.

A guessing competition in which visitors were invited to guess the number of nuts and bolts in the Transporter Bridge brought over 100 entries at 3d. each, and the Meccanograph did a roaring trade at 2d. per design, visitors turning the handle themselves. Models built for the stand afterwards exhibited in a Meccano dealer's window, and attracted much attention.

Special Awards for Club Members.

I am most desirous of encouraging as far as I possibly can the reading of instructive papers by members at their Club meetings. This kind of training I consider to be most excellent for boys. To stand up before a meeting of his friends and address them upon a subject with which he has made himself familiar requires some degree of courage for a boy, but it is a splendid thing for him to do. The knowledge gained in reading up his subject is useful, and it is also a very fine thing for him to accustom himself to speaking in public. He is also serving his Club well in providing enjoyable and interesting evenings. I am, therefore, arranging special awards in the form of handsome bronze medallions for this work.

Each Club will be allotted two medallions, one for each Winter session, and they will be given to the boys who deliver the best papers. Any

subjects may be selected, Engineering, Electricity, Woodworking, Stamp Collecting, &c. Boys may get any help from parents, Club Leader, or any other source, in the preparation of their papers, which may be illustrated by lantern slides, drawings, photographs, models, or in any other way. After they have been read at the Club meetings, the papers must be sent to me with any comments by the Secretary or Club Leader, and the adjudication will be made at the end of each session.

The medallions are very beautiful in both design and finish, and are being produced specially for us by Messrs. Elkington & Sons, Birmingham. Each one will be engraved with the name of the recipient.

I trust all Club Leaders will help me to make this valuable part of the Meccano Club work a very big success.

Each Member of the Guild gets a beautiful Certificate.



I am able to illustrate here a very beautiful Certificate, which our President wishes me to place in the hands of every member of the Guild. Mr. Hornby wishes each of you to have this Certificate framed in a simple way and put up in your home, preferably your bedroom, as a constant reminder of the splendid Guild objects which you have promised to further.

I am mailing out these Certificates to you as fast as I can have them made up, and each new applicant for membership will receive one along with his badge. I am quite confident that every member of the Guild will set a high value on his Certificate, and that he will treasure it as a sign of his association and friendship with a million of the best boys in the country.

Guild Recruiting Campaign.

How each Member can help the movement.

Hundreds of enthusiastic Guild members have written to me during the past 12 months expressing their keen desire to put in all the work they can on behalf of the Guild, and asking in what way they can help. Now is the time when they and all other Guild members can do a good turn to the movement. Where boys know and understand the objects of the Guild they come in enthusiastically and without hesitation, but there are many many thousands of boys in this country who are using Meccano regularly and who yet have never heard either of the *Meccano Magazine* or the Meccano Guild.

If the Guild is going to be the big success we have aimed at we must get all these boys in, and it is the duty of each Guild member to do his best to spread the knowledge of the Guild amongst them.

If each of our members brings in one Meccano boy our membership will, of course, be doubled, but I want more than that. I want each member to endeavour to recruit at least three new members, and to each of you who does this the Guild will award a very handsome oxidised silver medallion, of which any of you may well be proud. Our illustration is full size and it is one of the most beautiful medallions I have ever seen.



As a special award the boy who obtains the largest number of recruits between September 1st, 1920, and March 1st, 1921, will receive an exact duplicate of the medallion, but in solid gold with his name engraved on it, and to the boy who recruits the next greatest number a solid silver medallion will be awarded, similarly engraved.

Every boy desiring to take his share in this Grand Recruiting Campaign should notify me, and I will send him a number of Guild Application forms. He should write his own name and address and the date on the back of these so that they may be recorded in his favour. He must also send in a full list of his recruits with names and addresses before March 15th, 1921, when the awards will be made.

Wanted—A Guild Motto.

Every one of our members seems to want us to adopt a motto, and after all it is very excellent to set up an ideal in this way, and endeavour with all our might to live up to it. One of our most earnest and capable Club Leaders has adopted for his Club the motto "Keen and Clean," and in a well-worded message to his Club he has urged them to live up to this motto. When we do adopt a motto for the Guild we want it to be the best in the world, and I should very much like our members to give me their ideas as to whether or not we should adopt a motto, and if so, what that motto should be.

Special Cash Prizes for Guild Members.

You will see on another page of this issue that a new £250 prize competition is announced, and I want Guild members to carefully note the new conditions which govern this competition, especially that part of it which offers special cash prizes to members of the Meccano Guild. Neither myself nor anyone else connected with the Guild has anything to do with the awarding of prizes, but I shall certainly watch the next list of awards with great interest. I am keenly anxious that Guild members shall shine in the new big Contest and shall take away some of the numerous excellent prizes which are offered.

Apology to our Readers.

It was intended that this issue of the Meccano Magazine should be in the hands of our readers on September 1st, but, unfortunately, the grave printer's strike which affected Liverpool and Manchester rendered this impossible.

We must express our sincere regrets that so much delay has taken place. In future, the Magazine will be issued regularly every two months.

Meccano Guild Correspondence Club.

Meccano users have for long felt that they were members of a great brotherhood of boys, all thinking the same kind of thoughts, sharing the same pleasures and thrilled by the same ambitions. They yearn to know what kind of lives the other boys are living, to tell them about their own schemes and ambitions and to swap notes about Meccano model building, and all the other things which boys delight in. I have often been urged to start a Correspondence Club, and the founding of the Guild now makes this possible.

If you are a member of the Guild and you would like to correspond with another member in some other part of the country, just sit down and write him a simple letter, telling him where you live, what Outfit you have, which models you like best and anything about your home life or the place you live in which you think might interest him. Then send your letter to me and I will send it on to another member of the Guild in some other part of the country, who also desires to correspond.

Only the first letter need be sent through me, and after that you may correspond direct upon any subject which will make your letters bright and interesting. Meccano topics will, naturally, form the basis of your correspondence, for it is here that you meet on common ground. You can compare outfits, describe your experiences with the hobby and help each other generally to get further pleasure from building and inventing.

I should very much like all boys who enter into correspondence in this way to describe local industries and all that concerns them, as I feel that this will be the means of imparting useful and instructive knowledge. Before writing your letter will you please read the following rules very carefully and see that they are properly complied with:—

1. All correspondence will be arranged by the Guild Secretary.
2. Applications for enrolment with the Correspondence Club must state name, age, and address of applicant and father's occupation.
3. The first letter written must be sent through Head-quarters; after that, correspondence will be carried on direct.

4. Photographs may be exchanged, but correspondents are not allowed to either send or ask for presents or gifts of any kind whatever.
5. The Guild Secretary has the right to call on any member at any time for the letters he has received as a result of introduction through the Correspondence Club.
6. Boys desiring to discontinue correspondence should mutually arrange with their partners, and also inform the Secretary.
7. A request for enrolment signifies that the applicant accepts these rules as binding and final, and that he intends to loyally abide by them.

Special Club Prizes.

I have been gratified to find that all the Meccano Clubs during the last session have made a special feature of Meccano model building at their meetings, and as I am very desirous of encouraging those features of Club work which provide most enjoyment, it gives me much pleasure to announce that the Guild has decided to make special contributions to the funds of those Clubs whose members excel in this work.

The Club which designs the best model, during each winter session, will receive a cash award of £5, and the Club which designs the second best model, an award of £3. Each model must be the joint work of the Club members, and must be started and finished at the Club meetings under the guidance of the Club Leader. There will be no restrictions in regard to the size or the type of the model, or the number of parts used in making it.

The judge will be our President, Mr. Frank Hornby, whose decision will be final. In judging, no special consideration will be given to the size of the model and the award will be based principally on ingenuity, novelty, and mechanical accuracy. The model itself should not be sent in for adjudication; all that is necessary being a good, clear photograph or drawing with a simple description of any points which require explanation. Entries must be received at Guild Head-quarters, addressed Guild Competition, Head-quarters, Meccano Ltd., Binns Road, Liverpool, not later than January 15th for the first session, and May 15th for the second session.

Now, boys, here's a chance to do your Club a good turn, confer distinction on it and improve its financial position. Discuss the matter with your Leaders and Secretaries and let me know that you intend to compete.

Meccano at the Jamboree

Those Meccano boys who visited the Jamboree held at Olympia, London, during the first week in August were fortunate boys indeed. The event was well conceived and excellently carried out. We visited it ourselves, and were much impressed by the keenness, enthusiasm, and cleverness of the boys who took part in it. We have never seen so many boys congregated together before, and the organisation must have felt proud of the success which crowned their earnest work. The Meccano stand was, of course, a great object of attraction, and all day long crowds of boys of all nationalities were eager witnesses of demonstrations of electrically-driven Meccano models and Hornby clockwork trains. Parents also came along in very large numbers to talk with our representatives and to register their appreciation of what Meccano had done for their boys, and their warm approval of the Meccano Guild and its objects. The Meccano models on display were an electrically-driven loco. and carriages, a warehouse with elevator, a magnetic crane, a Handley Page aeroplane, and a splendidly designed working model of a coal cutter driven by the Meccano clockwork moto..

In the Annexe, packs of Wolf Cubs were engaged all day in erecting Meccano models. A competition was run through the week and prizes were given to the packs who built the best models and showed the most cleverness. The utmost enthusiasm was shown, and the work was well and quickly done. The winning packs were:—

During the week several models were made by Boy Scouts at their own request, some of the American boys showing up very well in constructing original models.

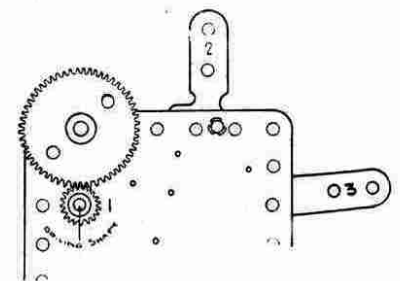

The wheel mounted on the driving-spindle is the $\frac{1}{2}$ in. Meccano pinion; the wheel engaged by the pinion is the 56-toothed gear.

Properly used, the Meccano Clockwork Motor will do excellent service for



many years, and will greatly enhance the joys of model building by giving life and movement to the models.

A new big Meccano Model Building Contest has started, and we want every Meccano boy to know all about it. There are no restrictions or entrance fees. Any Meccano boy can enter, and the competitor sending in a simple model made with a No. 0 stands just as good a chance of winning a prize as one sending in a complicated model made from a No. 6 Outfit. This Competition will close on April 15th, 1921.
