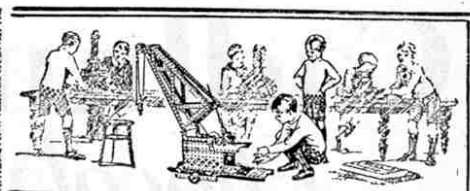




CLUB NOTES
